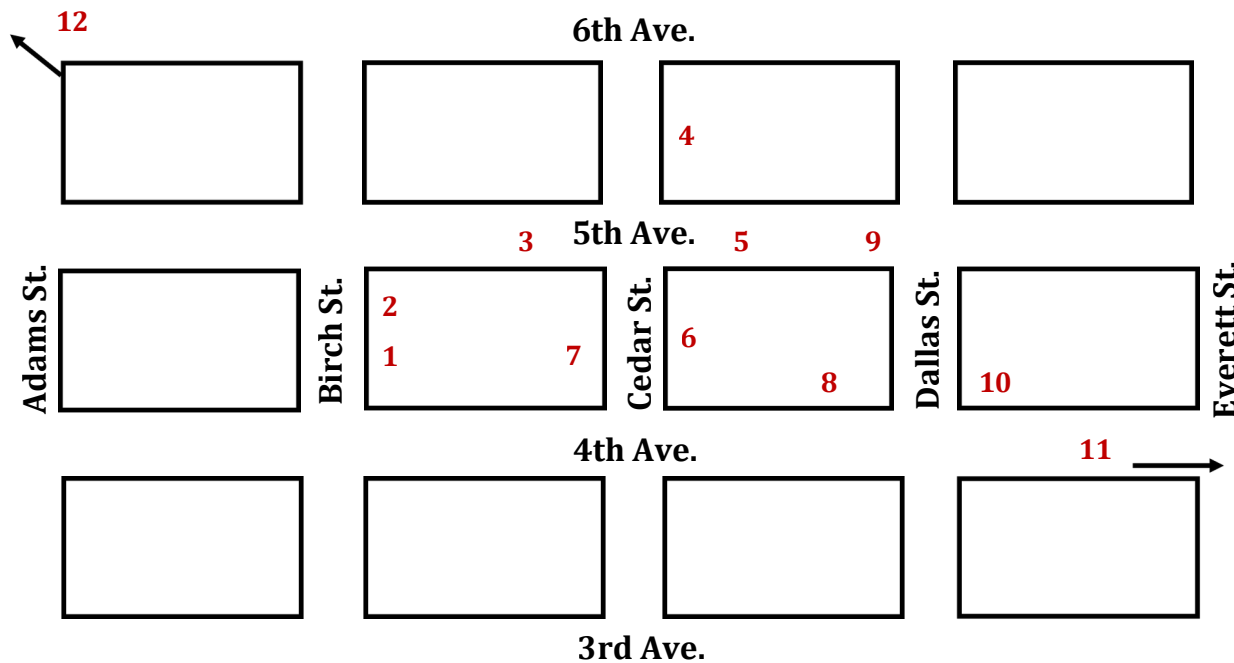

Enjoy the Murals in Downtown Camas!

- Camas Icons** — A vibrant mural on the Birch Street side of Camas Antiques, filled with local landmarks and fun details like bees, geese, the American Empress, and even Sasquatch. Created as a Camas High School senior project by Kayla Ramirez with mentor Anna Norris in 2022.
- The Pillars of Our Community** — This student art mural depicts the high density tanks located along 6th Ave at the Camas Paper Mill. These tanks held pulp on its way to the paper machines and have stood for many years as a landmark in the community. This mural, painted by Charlie Irwin in 2026, helps us remember the mill's history, importance to the town, and the opportunities it helped to provide.
- Camas Culture Art Block**— A collaboration with Hayes Freedom 2024 senior, Maria Navarro Alejandres, established a Camas Culture Art Block in Downtown Camas to increase representation and celebrate the many diverse cultures of people living in Camas through art. Completed in 2024.
- The Livingston Mural** — The new mural by Molly Keen, completed in 2025, brings a fresh burst of color and creativity to Downtown Camas. Painted entirely by brush, her bold style and attention to detail make this piece an inspiring addition to the town's growing collection of public art.
- Camas Love Mural** — Designed and painted by Hailee Parman, for her senior project. The now iconic mural is on 5th Avenue near Cedar St. completed in 2020.
- We're All Connected** — Designed and painted by Kate Patrick. Mural depicts the PNW and our connectedness in Camas.
- OF Johnson Building Mural**—Mural depicting the 300 block of 4th Ave. Painted by Dennis McLean in 2005. (located inside)
- Natalia's Cafe Mural** — Painted by Anna Norris in 2020 and depicts a well-known, beautiful downtown streetscape (located inside).
- Living New Deal** — The post office contains a Section of Fine Arts mural by Douglas Nicholson, Beginning of a New World, 1941 (located inside).
- Cats At Lutz** — Painted by Anna Norris in 2017. These cats are in memory and honor of the cats Lutz Hardware has had to greet customers over the years - Coaster, Socket and Dallas
- Street Emblems** — In 2016, Camas High School sophomores of the Integrated Arts & Academics program, helped to paint the art designed by their peer, Brianna Cloutier, who was also there to help. A contest had been held when the students were freshmen to create the design for the DCA . The mural adds vibrancy and sense of place on either side of the location of the Camas Farmer's Market.
- Young's Deli Mural** — The mural was painted by Alan Jeffs at Young's Deli on 6th Avenue in 2018 and pays respect to the history of Camas and the region.
